SPEAKERS:

James P. Flynn is a member of the litigation practice at Epstein Becker & Green, where he concentrates his practice in civil litigation and corporate counseling involving intellectual property, trade secrets and complex commercial matters. He also has written and lectured on the protection of confidential information and the risks and rewards associated with the use of social media in the workplace and in business. Additionally, he is a member of his firm's Litigation Department Steering Committee and his firm's Quality Assurance Committee. In these roles, and as a consequence of having served two four-year terms on District Ethics Committees appointed by the New Jersey Supreme Court, he has experience in dealing with a variety of ethical issues confronting inside and outside counsel in regard to questions presented by new media and technology.

Ken Strutin is the Director of Legal Information Services at the New York State Defenders Association where he has worked in various capacities for more than twelve years. Previously he has worked as a litigator and teacher. Mr. Strutin is the author of more than 100 published articles including scholarly writings about the intersections of social media and law practice. He has lectured frequently on Internet and legal technology, and most recently on the litigation and ethical issues created by social networking.

Roland Trope is a partner in the New York offices of Trope and Schramm LLP. He advises on protecting intellectual property in government procurements, cross-border corporate acquisitions, technology licensing, cyberspace law, and ethics for counsel and clients in such transactions. Mr. Trope is the co-author of two books published by the ABA -- *Checkpoints in Cyberspace: Best Practices for Averting Liability in Cross-Border Transactions*, and *Sailing in Dangerous Waters: A Director's Guide to Data Governance*. He is an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Law at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and serves on the Supervisory Board of IEEE Security & Privacy.

Scholarship / Financial Hardship Policy

A limited number of scholarships are available to judges, law clerks, law professors, law students, attorneys, pro bono attorneys and paralegals who work for nonprofit organizations, legal service organizations or government agencies, recent graduates not yet employed, and unemployed attorneys who must take CLE courses in order to meet their state requirements.

All requests must be made in writing accompanied by a completed registration form. No more than three requests per person will be considered in any one year. Requests should describe the applicant's interest in the topic and justification for a waiver of fees.

Requests should be accompanied by a recommendation from an instructor in the case of students, or supervisors in the case of law clerks or paralegals.

Requests and scholarships are not transferable. Approval will be based on need and funds available on a first come first served basis. If approved, the scholarship will result in a waiver of the course fees for the specific program application. To apply, please send your request, in writing, prior to the reservation form deadline. Students must submit a copy of their student identification cards.
